# Rector's Column

*"Where there is no vision, the people perish: but the one who lives in Covenant with God is happy."  
Proverbs 29:18*

Dear Friends,

Over the coming months beginning in September and lasting into December, Trinity will enter a time of collective reflection, listening, and planning towards renewing Trinity's sense of mission and vision – a time to thoughtfully chart our course across changing seas in order to reach the destinations we determine together. With the aid of consultants and the support and participation of our ordained and lay leadership, our entire congregation will enter a time of sabbatical. A sabbatical (from the Hebrew: שַׁבָּת *Šabat* or *Shabbat*) is a rest or break from work - a period of time intentionally spent on something that's not one's usual or annual routine.



The concept of the sabbatical is based on the Biblical practice of *shmita* (sabbatical year), which is related to agriculture. According to Leviticus 25, Hebrews in the Land of Israel had to take a yearlong break from working the fields every seven years. Agricultural practices that keep the land and crops healthy provide opportunities for natural cycles that enrich the soil and restore resources – such as water and beneficial microbiomes – while also providing an extended rest for laborers.

Trusting in the cycles of life, transformation, and renewal is a spiritual teaching that is embodied in Trinity's Marian Chapel. We read it in the symbols therein of birth, death, and resurrection that is essential to the nature of God's Creation and central to the stories of our faith. Actions of sowing seed and harvesting the fruits of the earth are akin to our ability to respond to God's call to participate as co-laborers in God's mission field, serving one another and those beyond the doors of our church who need our presence and our care.

A decade ago, Trinity developed our current Mission and Vision statements: ***"The Mission of our community is found in our commitment to forming leaders and building community by seeking and serving Christ in all God's creation. Our Vision is embodied in our collective ministry of nurturing God's Spirit alive in a community that embodies God's hope and love in the world."***

In the natural life cycles of any organization, it is an important aspect of corporate vitality to consider anew how we understand our unique identity and history, our gifts and charism, our hopes and dreams. Over recent years, many denominations including the Episcopal Church have experienced the changing social landscapes that have contributed to trends of declining membership and clergy shortages. Additionally, the global pandemic of COVID-19 had significant impacts on both for-profit and non-profit businesses, including the Church. Through it all, Trinity has remained afloat and is tolerably well in terms of the response of our members to financial needs and corporate worship. Yet, there is work we need to do together, and the time has come a stance of reacting to needs to proactively developing a sustainable long-term plan that support a renewed vision adaptive to our changing world, changing region, and changing Church.

As Trinity's communal sabbatical unfolds over the final quarter of the year, I hope that each one of you will engage the opportunities for listening, dialog, and participation in the renewal of our vision, mission, and strategic planning for the future into which God is calling us. Look for more information and invitations to come and enter this sacred time as one of reflective rest, creativity, and hope. For, we have much for which to be thankful in years gone by and much to be hopeful for in years to come.

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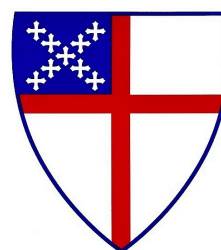

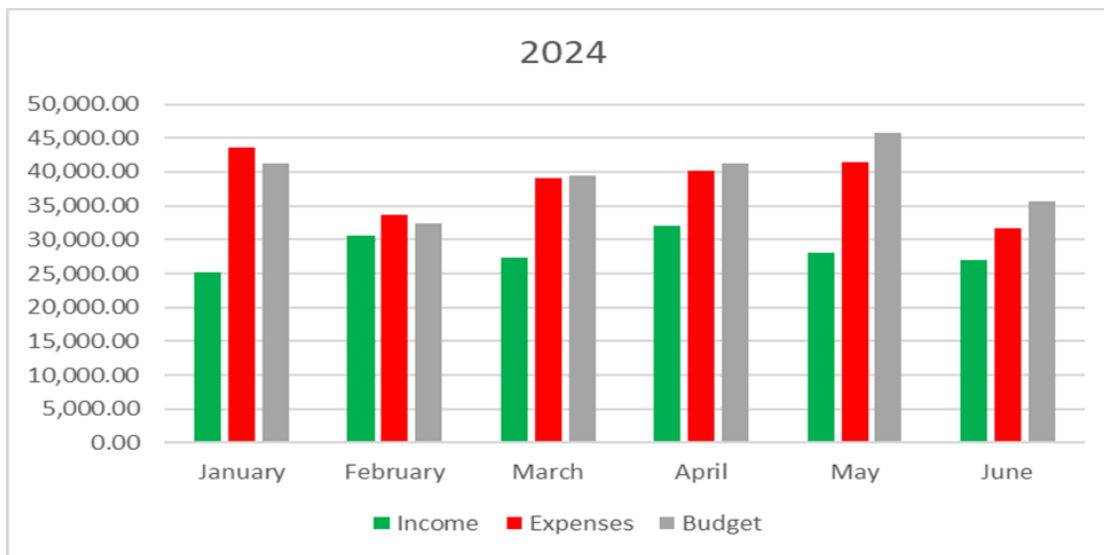

# TREASURER'S REPORT

Greetings Fellow Parishioners,

The graph is for the first six months of the year 2024. The left green bar is income, the center red bar is the actual expenses, and the right gray bar is the budget for comparison to expenses.



Looking at individual months we have the first two months, January and February, spending more than expected while the next four months are below what was budgeted for those months.

The actual expenses are tracking better than what is expected for the first half of the year. A variance of 0.97% under budget has accumulated over the first six months. This equates to our spending \$5,097.76 less than expected for the first half of this year of the year.

On January 1, 2024, we had a positive checking account balance which is not reflected in the budget. A balance \$8,265.51 plus the income \$220,594.34 covered all the expenses that were due through June. The remaining expenses recorded are the outstanding payroll taxes that are due and were paid in July.

As with any forecast, our budget is an educated guess for the year as to what expenses we will incur and how much income is needed. The budget funding not only keeps the doors open, but supports our outreach and food bank programs for the community, children weekend lunches, and holiday gift food baskets. Music, mission, fellowship, and other ministries are part of the budget also. Unplanned and emergency situations happen and we, along with the budget, must be flexible and adaptable throughout the year. We do not know what God has planned for us but He always provides all that we need.

There has been a great and generous response to the *Trinity Together* campaign. The funds are enough to supplement the budget income for the remainder of the year. Thank you to everyone at Trinity for truly living life as a disciple of Christ.

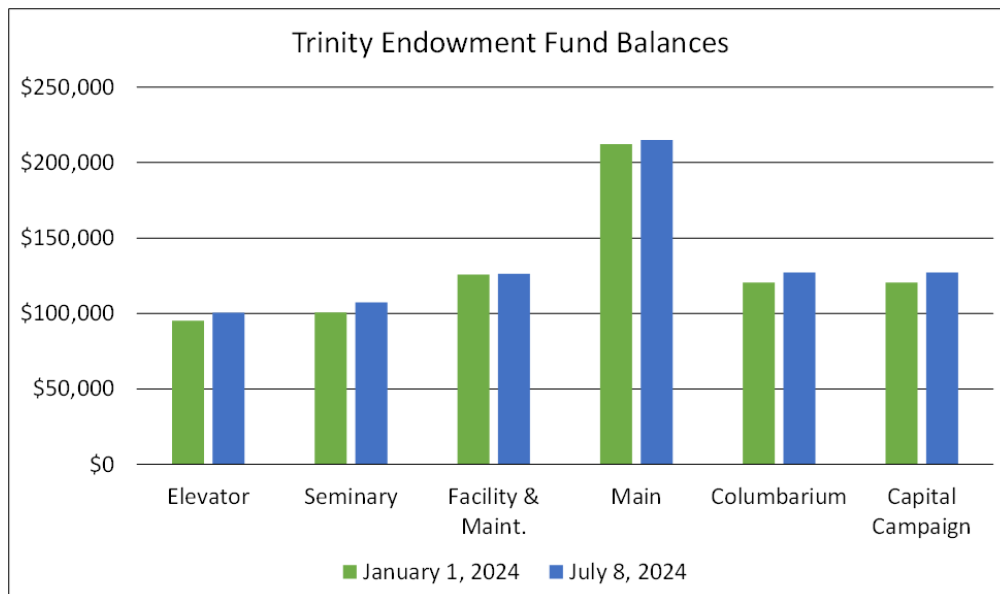
## ENDOWMENT FUND

The total balance of the Trinity endowment funds on July 8, 2024, was \$803,721, up from \$775,067 on January 1, 2024, and up from \$727,190 on January 1, 2023. The total balance in the endowment funds as of July 8, 2024, was 3.7% higher than on January 1, 2024, and 10.55% higher than on January 1, 2023.

So far this year, approximately \$14,500 has been withdrawn from the endowment funds for use by the church. About \$8,690 or 60% of this amount was withdrawn from the Main Endowment Fund and \$5,810 or 40% was withdrawn from the Facilities & Maintenance Fund. Approximately 5% of the Main Endowment Fund balance is contributed to Trinity's operating fund each year and up to \$9,000 can be withdrawn annually from the Facilities & Maintenance Fund for facility maintenance and improvement expenses. According to the Endowment Committee Bylaws, certain amounts can be withdrawn annually from the endowment funds for various purposes.

As of July 8, 2024, there was \$127,133 in the Capital Campaign Endowment Fund. This is only a portion of the total funds retained from the recent capital campaign. In addition to the amount in the Capital Campaign Endowment Fund, \$ \_\_\_\_\_ is currently held in the Capital Campaign checking account.

The amounts in the endowment funds are invested with UBS Financial Services, Inc., and our UBS financial advisor is in Everett. A combination of equities (42%), fixed income (36%), other investments (19%) and cash (3%) make up the investments for our funds. The overall investment strategy is considered "Moderate" risk by UBS. The total balances in the endowment funds on January 1, 2024 and July 8, 2024 are shown in the following chart:

The Endowment Committee held its quarterly meeting with the UBS financial advisor on July 11<sup>th</sup> to review the status of the endowment funds and determine if any changes should be made in the investment strategy. ## Renovation Team Update

We received the bids for Phase I of our proposed renovation project, which is primarily the replacement of Trinity's steam boiler system. Unfortunately, the bids came in about \$350,000 higher than the cost estimate. Our funding shortfall for Phase I is now about \$591,000.

Members of the Renovation Team have discussed the impact of the bids on our ability to fund the project, and we do not think we can undertake the project as it is currently designed. Since the architect and the mechanical engineer did not indicate that any kind of partial implementation of the HVAC replacement is feasible, we feel that we will probably need to go in a different direction. The Team feels it is important to use the funds raised in the Capital Campaign for some kind of immediate improvements to Trinity.

The Vestry has been presented with a conceptual plan to undertake portions of our Phase I project not related to the HVAC replacement with a few other adjustments. The following is proposed:

- Work with our boiler maintenance technician to establish a plan for maintaining our existing heating system to extend its operating life, such as proactive maintenance activities and parts acquisition. Establish a reserve fund to meet the planned and unplanned costs associated with the boiler operation, using a contribution from the Capital Campaign funds.

- Discuss with our architect, Lee Driftmier, what components of the original renovation project we could accomplish with the Capital Campaign funds currently available. Proposed tasks to be evaluated are:

  - Improvement to Rogers Hall such as new flooring, painting, new lighting, a new drop ceiling, removal of the basketball backboard;

  - Remodeling of the restrooms;

  - Installation of a commercial quality, fully permitted stairlift system funded by the elevator endowment.

- Investigate potential backup heating systems that could be implemented quickly if the boiler fails, such as baseboard heaters in Rogers Hall.

We know this is disappointing news for everyone, but the Vestry and the Renovation Team will continue to work with the money we have available to make the best possible decisions for our parish. Our goals are to improve our current facility, both for our own use and to increase our marketability as a rental space, and to ensure we will be able to meet future maintenance needs.

I believe in God. I love Jesus, the Trinity, I love being an Episcopalian Christian. I am grateful to belong to a church family that welcomes the marginalized, that encourages us to think.

I am content that I don't really understand everything; I have faith it will all work out, and my job, as we say in Alcoholics Anonymous, to seek, *"through prayer and meditation, to improve our conscious contact with God as we understood Him, praying only for knowledge of His will for us and the power to carry that out."*

I don't believe I have to discredit another's belief system (who am I to say?) in order to be a Christian. With so much divisive political rhetoric leading up to the presidential election this fall, I have to remind myself to take a deep breath, to try to truly listen and dialogue. And pray for understanding. What does this have to do with church music? I find myself at a loss for words sometimes in prayer. But I find *paying attention to the words* of the hymns we sing at our weekly Eucharist help me connect more deeply. I admit that it's sometimes hard to focus on prayer during a busy service when I am responsible for the next musical cue and have to play the support necessary for others to pray, but it's getting easier. I notice that there are some at Trinity who insist they are not singers, but who still pray the words along with us quietly. This is awesome. Gathering together in community prayer to support each other is so important. And, as our Sr. Warden, Eileen, mentioned last month, it's important to show up for others, even if you're not in the mood. We never know when the opportunity will arise.

## **A note from the Hospitality Committee**

Richard and I would like to thank all of you who have generously contributed to the work of the Hospitality Committee. SO MANY of you have brought food, helped serve, and clean up for coffee hour and the other special events our committee hosts. We believe the work of this committee is critically important to our church's spiritual health and wellbeing because of the valuable time it provides for our family of faith to gather together and build one another up. Trinity's *hospitality* was one of the features that first attracted us to this church family, and we love being a part of the hospitality ministry here.

The word hospitality originates from the same words as hospice and hospital and was first used to describe how one should treat foreigners who were traveling through your lands. In the Old Testament (Leviticus 19:33-34) God commands the Israelites to treat foreigners with **hospitality**, "*When a foreigner resides among you in your land, do not mistreat them. The foreigner residing among you must be treated as your native-born. Love them as yourself, for you were foreigners in Egypt. I am the Lord your God.*" Several places in the New Testament, **hospitality** is referred to as a spiritual gift and we are instructed to extend this gift to strangers and to our brothers and sisters in Christ, without grumbling or complaining. [Romans 12:13; 1 Timothy 5:10; Hebrews 13:2; and 1 Peter 4:9]

Hospitality means to provide a place of health and healing for weary travelers / strangers to rest and replenish their strength so they can better continue on their life's journey. One way our hospitality committee seeks to meet this need is during coffee hour on Sunday mornings, by providing a "safe place" for people to rest, refresh, heal and continue their journey. Other areas of service involve providing meals for special events (Mardi Gras, Thanksgiving, Dinner Auction, etc.) and serving at wedding or funeral receptions. If this sounds like something you would like to be a part of, we certainly could use your help. Below are listed different ways you can be involved. We will provide a training session in early October to show you how to operate the dishwasher and give you a tour of the kitchen. Please stay tuned for these updates and the date of our Trinity Ministry Fair.

### **Types of involvement:**

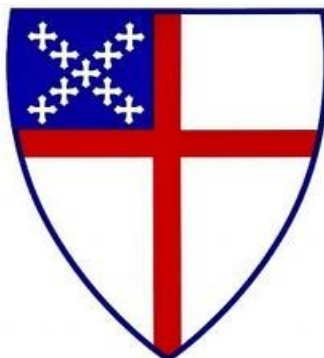
