Dear Friends,

I pray that you are finding encouragement and grace from the guest consultants and preachers who are visiting Trinity throughout this Sabbatical time. It is also my intention and hope that David Spring, Dianne McCormack, and Rev. Allen Hicks are also taking some intentional time to rest. I am among the last of the rectors within our diocese to have taken some Sabbatical time following the pandemic, and David Spring worked very hard during the same period to continue Trinity's music program in new and creative ways.



New and creative ways of moving forward as communities of faith, as dioceses, and as the diverse international body that is The Episcopal Church organization is a common theme across the church. My sincere hope is that as many of you as are able will participate in the special offerings being provided by a variety of consultants and preachers, adult forums and presenters, who are vising Trinity each month. This is a time for thoughtful reflection, gentle engagement with one another, and for encouraging a faithful vision for Trinity.

The autumn is my favorite time of year, lending itself as a particularly appropriate season for reflecting on the past, pondering the possibilities of the future, and preparing for both the deep slumber of winter and the holiday celebrations it holds. For the past three decades of my ministry, I have thundered into the final quarter of every year with busy programmatic, reports and budget preparation, and the increase of pastoral care needs/funerals that seem to accompany the time. I am grateful for to have the time this year to pull back on the throttle of the swiftly moving train that is my ministry and life, allowing me for the first time in a long while to experience the fall season as I did when I was younger – as a time for reading, for memorizing poetry, for writing, and for dreaming. Nothing can become real in the world without first having been dreamed.

I know that this month of November is beginning as a stressful time for our nation with the election cycle. I was reminded again recently that the only thing that can overcome the darkness of evil is the light of courageous hope. Meeting darkness with more darkness only makes all people blind. We are all of us affected by the crimes of global leaders whose self-interest and lack of empathy would drag the entire earth to its doom without hesitation. The domination thinking of empire was as useless and pitiful in the time of Christ as it is today. The power of Jesus' theological, cultural, and political challenge to the powers and authorities of his day continue to to the powers and authorities of his day continue to resonate in our time. In a truly democratic society, our power as citizens resides in our vote. Any action that would hinder, gerrymander, dispossess citizens from their right to vote, or manipulate results must be challenged in courts of law. There is a reason that our Sunday prayers of the people include prayers for our local and national governance - as a nation and as a church, we fought and died for independence from despotic and cruel leadership. From my recent travels, I can tell you that all the world is watching our presidential election, and they are worried.

This November, we have the power to change the world by how we vote. We can contribute to a terrible gathering darkness or we can dispel it by being the beacon of light that the world needs us to be as a people and as a nation. We must have the courage of hope to leave the ravaging traditions of empire behind us as a global society, and we must grow up. We must grow beyond prejudice, beyond greed, beyond ignorance. We must rather live by the eternal truth of our faith that requires our utmost compassion and love for others, our responsible stewardship of Creation, and our commitment to participating in the ongoing power of resurrection. Our story doesn't end on the cross, not ever. Like Christ, we must we *rise* to the occasion.



Greetings Fellow Parishioners,

The fiscal year 2025 operating budget estimate has begun and some numbers have already been entered. Estimating expenses is a matter of finding the negotiated contracts of the utilities and inflation rate. Prices for most items like paper, pens, communion wine, flowers, and other everyday items will increase with inflation. The 114th Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Olympia, October 25-26 set the cost-of-living-adjustment for clergy at 3.8%; as well as the Diocesan assessment for 2025 to be 14.5% again.

During our stewardship campaign please prayerfully and thoughtfully consider a pledge to Trinity. Pledges give an estimate of our income for the year. Other income items like building use rental fees, our endowment distribution, and fundraisers make up approximately 10 percent of the budget. Turning in your pledge card will give a better idea of how Trinity will fare during the 2025 year.

The Trinity Together Campaign has provided enough funds to complete the budget for this year. Any surplus will become the starting balance for the new year. This will amount to approximately 10 percent of the budget. Thus the **2025 Stewardship**

Trinity Endowment Funds


Trinity Endowment Funds

The total balance of the Trinity endowment funds on October 8, 2024 was \$834,222, up from \$775,067 on January 1, 2024 and up from \$727,190 on January 1, 2023. The total balance in the endowment funds as of October 8, 2024 was 7.6% higher than on January 1, 2024 and 14.7% higher than on January 1, 2023. The total return on the endowment fund portfolio, prior to withdrawals by the church and payment of investment fees, was 9.55% this year as of October 8, 2024.

So far this year, approximately \$14,560 has been withdrawn from the endowment funds for use by the church. About \$8,820 or 61% of this amount was withdrawn from the Main Endowment Fund and \$5,740 or 39% was withdrawn from the Facilities & Maintenance Fund. Approximately 5% of the Main Endowment Fund balance is contributed to Trinity's operating fund each year and up to \$9,000 can be withdrawn annually from the Facilities & Maintenance Fund for facility maintenance and improvement expenses. According to the Endowment Committee Bylaws, certain amounts can be withdrawn annually from the endowment funds for various purposes.

As of October 8, 2024, there was \$131,911 in the Capital Campaign Endowment Fund. This is only a portion of the total funds retained from the recent capital campaign. In addition to the amount in the Capital Campaign Endowment Fund, \$213,626 was held in the Capital Campaign checking account as of October 1, 2024.

The amounts in the endowment funds are invested with UBS Financial Services, Inc., and our UBS financial advisor is in Everett. A combination of equities (41%), fixed income (38%), other investments (18%) and cash (3%) make up the investments for our funds. The overall investment strategy is considered "Moderate" risk by UBS. The total balances in the endowment funds on January 1, 2024 and October 8, 2024 are shown in the following chart:



The Endowment Committee held its most recent quarterly meeting with the UBS financial advisor on October 17, 2024 to review the status of the endowment funds and determine if any changes should be made in the investment strategy. The meeting was held at the UBS office in Everett and was the first in-person meeting of the Endowment Committee since January 2020. It was nice to see everyone in real life after several years of Zoom meetings.

Report on the 114th Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Olympia

"Come to Me, & I Will Give You Rest"

The Diocese of Olympia holds a convention every year bringing together clergy and delegates from all parishes in the diocese to conduct diocesan business, present information about current activities, share ideas, worship and socialize. The convention is held in-person every other year alternating with online meetings to save money. This year the convention was held on October 25th and 26th at the Tacoma Convention Center with about 350 clergy and lay people present. It was the first Diocese

of Olympia convention for our new Bishop, Phil La-Belle, which added a bit of excitement and freshness

to the proceedings.

The first day of the two-day convention was devoted to four workshop sessions with nine choices in each time block, ranging from Supporting Palestinian Christians to Artificial Intelligence. There was a convention session, midday to officially open the convention and evening prayer after the last workshop.

The second day started with delegates picking up electronic keypads for voting. We gathered in the large ballroom for Holy Eucharist with the Bishop's address and Rite of Healing. Bishop Phil gave a moving, heartfelt sermon apologizing for past mistreatment of Indigenous Peoples, peoples of color, LGBTQ persons and ongoing, built-in white supremacy attitudes. He announced that a gift allowed the Di-



ocese to buy Harmony House which will be renamed Sacred Waters and will be a place of rest and renewal for all.

We voted for positions for the Commission on Ministry, the Diocesan Council and the Standing Committee. There were three resolutions to consider. We passed the resolution on the 2026 diocesan assessment rate (remaining at 14.5%) and the resolution on the cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) for clergy and diocesan staff at 3.8%, calculated for the diocesan area. The diocesan budget for 2025 was also approved.

Resolution #3 titled "A Call to the Church for Action Toward Ceasefire & a Just Peace in Israel & Palestine" was postponed indefinitely after hearing deeply felt opinions for and against.

Numerous speakers updated us on happenings in the diocese which included a video about the diocesan youth sailing trip last summer on the Salish Sea aboard the 133-foot, Adventuress, a 110 year old tall ship. Bishop Phil then awarded four Bishop's Cross Awards including a posthumous one to The Rev. Jerry Shigaki for which there was a standing ovation.

Hicks was our clergy member in attendance and Lawrence Sylvester also attended as a member of the diocesan Standing Committee. We recommend serving as a delegate for Trinity in the future, if you have the opportunity, to experience firsthand how this diocese functions.

Weekend food program for Kids School year 2024-2025

We again are joined with Port Gardner Community Church to provide food on weekends for students at North Middle School here in Everett. This means that we collect food every week for the children that are identified by the School that are on the free breakfast/lunch program to provide to them nutrition on the weekends. Please keep in mind that some of the children are homeless and may have minimal cooking facilities.



We have a grocery cart with a yellow school bus attached to the front of it that was donated by a local QFC store. We have a team of volunteers that collect the food donated on Sunday and they take it to the Team Leader of Port Gardner CC on Sunday. It is their group that process the items into grocery bags for the kids to take home on

Friday. The school staff distribute the bags to the children. It is a team effort! Some samples of the foods we accept for this outreach program are:

small 15-16 0z **canned** foods: soups, chili, pasta, vegetables, and fruit cups

individual box packages of fruit juices (no sugar added, usually come in 8, 8oz), individually packaged cereals, (oatmeal) dry soups, (Top Ramen), snacks, breakfast bars. Protein bars, **all individually packaged**).

We <u>cannot</u> use items such as: large canned soup or beans, large boxed cereals, whole packages of dry pasta, canned or in jars Spaghetti sauce. Nothing that requires refrigeration (most cheese) No fresh fruits or veggies.

Please remember the hungry in our midst. We are beginning this Sept. with 12 children. This number usually increases throughout the fall. Last year we were consistently feeding 24 each weekend! This is not an easy task to provide 2 breakfasts, 2 lunch meals, 3 dinner meals and snacks for the children every weekend! We need your help! Be generous! The goal is to fill the Kids food cart every Sunday!

Thank you for your generosity in providing the food for this program throughout the year!

I could use at least one more volunteer for the Sunday pick delivery. If you are interested give a call or email to Julie Amdal. It is one Sunday a month per a schedule and throughout the school year.

Orders and money are due to the Altar Guild November 24th. Delivery to the church will be December 14th at 1:00pm. You can pick up about an hour after that. We need time to collect them all.

It is the Altar Guild's Honor to serve as the Rector's guild and to carry out her liturgical visions. Being responsible for the proper care of the vessels, linens and priestly vestments used in the celebration of the Eucharist and other sacraments. This responsibility requires that reverent and high standards of care be upheld.


