

# Rector's Column

*"I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it?  
I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert.  
Isaiah 43:19*

Dear Friends,

*I hope this month's column can provide an update on the planned renovations at Trinity which include replacing our current boiler system with a modern heating/cooling system as well as improvements to Rogers Hall and existing bathrooms. .*

*A brief overview of the history of the renovations planning could be helpful here.*

*The Trinity Vestry of 2016 engaged in a vision and mission process that included parish surveys. This process identified needed changes in our physical plant in order to align parish priorities to better serve the public, stimulate new community partnerships, and emphasize a culture of welcome and hospitality. The Vestry entered into a contract with Driftmier architects, who conducted their own parish survey in 2017 that focused on detailing the desired physical attributes in order to inform the redesign of existing spaces and community discussions continued at Trinity throughout the year. In the fall of 2018, the Diocesan Architectural Committee approved Driftmier's design, and we prepared to launch a capital campaign to support the work. Unfortunately, a week after the plan was approved, Everett experienced a once in a century catastrophic flood that affected our entire lower level of classrooms and offices, resulting in a pause in our capital campaign and renovation plans that lasted for a year. Once the restorations of the lower level were completed in the fall of 2019, we made plans to launch the capital campaign for the spring of 2020. Sadly, once again all efforts were thwarted by the onset of the COVID-19 global pandemic. However, in the following year of 2021, Trinity undertook the Refresh, Renew and Rejoice Capital Campaign to encourage contributions for the purpose of funding the implementation of a variety of the proposed renovations.*

*The Capital Campaign was completed in January 2022, and the Trinity Vestry approved a revised plan that the concept of replacing the church's boiler system with a ventilation and air-conditioning system (HVAC). This request necessitated several months of evaluation by engineers and a redesign of Trinity's electrical system along with permit applications. The Vestry approved the redesign proposal in April of 2023. The permit application was submitted to the City of Everett on January 26, 2024, and the City of Everett approved the permit in March of 2024.*

*Once the final bids were submitted for the work, however, the Vestry recognized that funds collected during the capital campaign were insufficient to cover the expenses of the project which was then subsequently downsized and sorted into phases of development, with the first phase including: 1) Creating a separate heating/cooling system for Rogers Hall/kitchen, 2) Updating Rogers Hall for greater energy efficiency and enhancing its use as community space, and 3) Renovating the two principle bathrooms in the entry level hallway.*

*Even including endowment funds dedicated for improvement efforts, we may not have all the funds needed for the proposed first phase. Not all the capital campaign pledges have been fulfilled, and the no or low interest loans once provided by the diocese were phased out several years ago, so any loans we would consider would be at current bank rates. The Vestry expects to have new bids soon and will keep all of us apprised. We would all like to realize the hopes that began eight years ago, and may the Holy Spirit continue to keep the embers burning and bring our plans to life.*





# TREASURER'S REPORT

Greetings Fellow Parishioners,



The graph is for the month of January. The left green bar is income, the red middle bar is expenses, and the right bar is the monthly budget.

The income does not include \$8000 of the Trinity Together that was used in January. This money together with the January 1st checking account balance of \$9400, all bills were paid on time.

The Trinity financial year is starting out as expected. What traditionally happens at Trinity the first months of the year is

reflected in the graph. There are many changes in the budget from last year and it will take time to see their effects. I believe the quarterly reports will be better than the same period last year.


# ENDOWMENT FUND

The total balance of the Trinity endowment funds on February 7, 2025 was \$834,399, up from \$818,494 on January 1, 2025 and up from \$775,067 on January 1, 2024. The total balance in the endowment funds as of February 7, 2025 is 1.9% higher than on January 1, 2025 and 7.7% higher than on January 1, 2024. The total return on the endowment fund portfolio, prior to withdrawals by the church and payment of investment fees, was 2.1% so far in 2025.

During 2024, \$23,751 was withdrawn from the endowment funds for use by the church. About \$11,626 or 49% of this amount was withdrawn from the Main Endowment Fund, \$10,855 or 46% was withdrawn from the Facilities & Maintenance Fund and \$1,270 or 5% was withdrawn from the Seminary Fund. Approximately 5% of the Main Endowment Fund balance is contributed to Trinity's operating fund each year and up to \$9,000 can be withdrawn annually from the Facilities & Maintenance Fund for facility maintenance and improvement expenses. According to the Endowment Committee Bylaws, certain amounts can be withdrawn annually from the endowment funds for various purposes.

As of February 7, 2025, there was \$136,707 in the Capital Campaign Endowment Fund. This is only a portion of the total funds retained from the recent capital campaign. In addition to the amount in the Capital Campaign Endowment Fund, \$258,278 was held in the Capital Campaign checking account as of February 7, 2025.

The amounts in the endowment funds are invested with UBS Financial Services, Inc., and our UBS financial advisor is in Everett. A combination of equities (41%), fixed income (38%), other investments (18%) and cash (3%) make up the investments for our funds. The overall investment strategy is considered "Moderate" risk by UBS. The total balances in the endowment funds on January 1, 2024 (note, not January 1, 2025) and February 7, 2025 are shown in the following chart:

The Endowment Committee held its most recent quarterly meeting with the UBS financial advisor on January 16, 2025. The next meeting will be on April 3rd at 1:00 PM to review the status of the endowment funds and determine if any changes should be made in the investment strategy.

At its February meeting, the vestry approved two new members, Betsey Mullen and Allan Elenbaas, to three-year terms on the Endowment Committee. These new members will be replacing Don Stapleton and Kevin Mack who both served two consecutive three-year terms on the committee. Thanks to both Don and Kevin for their six years of service. Also, Evie Beard has indicated her retirement from participation as a long-term advisor to the Endowment Committee. Thank you, Evie, for all the wisdom and history provided to the committee over the years.


